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## **Executive Summary**

The Gender Budget, a crucial component of fiscal policy, embodies a commitment to promoting gender equality and women's empowerment through budgetary allocations and policies. It serves as a tool for assessing the impact of government spending on gender-related outcomes and addressing disparities in resource distribution. By integrating a gender perspective into budget formulation, implementation, and monitoring, the Gender Budget aims to enhance women's access to resources, opportunities, and services across various sectors. Key priorities typically include education, healthcare, employment, social protection, and infrastructure development, with targeted investments to address gender-based inequalities and promote women's economic and social advancement.

The State of Meghalaya boasts of having a comparative advantage towards achieving the Sustainable Development standalone goal 5- "Achieve gender equality and empower all girls and women", owing to a higher sex ratio of 989 females per 1000 males (census 2011). Furthermore, the state takes pride in its commendable female literacy rate, standing at 72.89%. The workforce participation rate of the State is higher than most Indian states as well. Adding to these demographic advantages, the Gender Budget was prepared to integrate gender-responsive initiatives and programmes into the State's budgeting process ensuring the effective utilization of public and private funds to address the all-pervasive issue of gender inequality.

The Government of Meghalaya recognizes the imperative of gender-responsive budgeting for advancing gender equality, social inclusion, and sustainable development. In this regard, the State has introduced various schemes to advance women's education, health, livelihood, and financial stability which have been broadly discussed in Chapter 4 of the Gender Budget 2024-25. With this objective, the Government of Meghalaya presents its third Gender Budget for the FY 2024-25. The total budget allocated to Gender for Meghalaya has increased from Rs 3354.4 crores in 2023-24 to Rs 5,271.01 crore in 2024-25 (budget estimates) constituting 19.5% of the total State Budget. Further, the Gender Budget has increased by 57.1% from the last financial year.

Going forward, the State will focus on providing support to women co-operative societies to facilitate market linkages for women-led enterprises, ensuring safety of women, and providing social security. Efforts will also be taken to promote socio-political development of women by strengthening the safety mechanisms and participation in governance. Learning from the cultural ethos of Meghalaya, the State will also strive towards building participatory governance through strong community ties and decentralized planning.

#### 1 Introduction

#### 1.1 Women in Meghalaya Today

The state of Meghalaya, nestled in the northeastern region of India, stands as a unique testament to the endurance of matrilineal traditions, distinguishing itself as one of the few remaining matrilineal societies in the world. With a sex ratio of 989 females per 1000 males, as per the 2011 census, Meghalaya showcases one of the most balanced gender distributions among all Indian states. Furthermore, the state takes pride in its commendable female literacy rate, standing at 72.89%, reflecting a minimal gender gap of 3.1 percentage points, the narrowest disparity observed across the nation. This achievement underscores Meghalaya's commitment to promoting educational opportunities for women, thereby empowering them with knowledge and skills essential for societal advancement. Additionally, data from the Periodic Labor Force Survey 2019-2020 reveals a noteworthy female worker population ratio of 44.1% in Meghalaya, surpassing the national average of 28.7%. This demonstrates the significant presence of women in the state's workforce, contributing actively to its economic growth and development.

Despite these notable indicators, gender inequality is all pervasive in our societies. Therefore, it requires constant attention and effort to mitigate any systematic oppression. As Meghalaya continues to strive towards gender equality and social inclusion, these statistics serve as testaments to the progress made and underscore the importance of further initiatives, such as the Gender Budget, in advancing the rights and well-being of women across the state.

#### 1.2 Need for Gender Equality

The Constitution of India not only grants equality to women, but also empowers the State to adopt measures of affirmative actions in favour of women. However, wide gaps exist between the goals enunciated in the Constitution, legislation, policies, plans, programmes, and related mechanisms on the one hand and the situational reality of women and girls, on the other. Achieving gender equity/ equality requires recognition of different needs, preferences and interests which affect the way men and women benefit from policies and budgetary allocations. Moreover, achieving gender equality stands as a paramount public policy objective globally, hence is assigned a stand-alone goal-5 of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development Goals.

Women and girls encounter diverse vulnerabilities across the stages of their lives. Theymay face discrimination, before or after birth- whether economic, political, social or religious. Their vulnerability persists regardless of their intersectional position within the society. Additionally, their susceptibility increases significantly if they are from a marginalized background. The National Sample Survey and the Census of India reveal that women from SC, ST, and Other Backward Classes (OBCs) are disproportionately represented in the informal and low-paying sectors such as agriculture and domestic work. This disparity underscores challenges in accessing formal employment opportunities and the prevalence

of workplace discrimination. Therefore, these gaps must be addressed socially as well as through adequate allocation of resources.

#### 1.3 State's response towards Gender Equality

The State of Meghalaya envisions to be amongst the top 10 states in the country by 2030 in terms of GDP and SDGs. It recognizes that this goal cannot be realized without warranting special attention to the social and economic needs of girls and women in Meghalaya.

The State is focused towards strengthening women led enterprises through initiatives, such as Farmer's Collectivization for Upscaling Production and Marketing System (FOCUS), to ensure economic growth and resource ownership. This further enables higher decision-making power amongst women. Economic agency also helps mitigate gender-based violence. This was stressed upon in the NAYI CHETNA 2.0 organized by the Meghalaya State Rural Livelihood Society to commemorate the International Day for Elimination of Violence against Women on 25<sup>th</sup> November 2023. The State aims to advance the rights of women and gender-diverse individuals, for a life without fear, and gender-based discrimination and violence. The State also introduced the Chief Minister's Safe Motherhood Scheme under the National Health Mission to institutionalize and improve access to quality maternal health care.

The Government of Meghalaya believes that women play an important role as catalysts of economic development in the State through their roles as citizens, mothers, and workers. Thus, the practice of gender budgeting was brought into the domain of public expenditure and policy to reaffirm the crucial role of women in the society.



# 2 Mainstreaming Gender Budget in Meghalaya

#### 2.1 Gender Budget

Gender Budget acts as a key fiscal policy tool for gender mainstreaming to advance gender equality. It is concerned with the gender sensitive formulation of legislation, policies, plans, programmes, and schemes; allocation and collection of resources; implementation and execution; monitoring, review, audit and impact assessment of programmes and schemes; and integrate corrective action to address gender disparities. Gender Budget helps to incorporate gender concerns at all levels of public expenditure to ensure that benefits of development reach women as much as men¹. It is an important public governance tool that helps various departments of the government to identify the gender gaps, integrate gender considerations into decisions, and take budgetary measures to advance gender equality². The Gender Budget, along with the related policies and programmes, will guide the State and its various departments to achieve gender equality, and a more inclusive and sustainable growth. It provides an overview of resources dedicated to women-centric programs and initiatives, as well as their impact on the overall development and well-being.

The development of women contributes to the development of the society in many ways. It is well known that women's education, health, and economic empowerment can lead to increased productivity, higher household incomes, and better health and education outcomes for their families. Therefore, empowering women is important as it is not only an intrinsic right, but also enables them to build their capabilities and contribute to the society. A strategic Gender Budget would help the Government of Meghalaya streamline its goals, programmes, and schemes towards achieving the SDG 5 goal of Gender Equality effectively.

Thus, in keeping with its objective to accomplish the long-term goal of equality and empowerment across genders, the State of Meghalaya is presenting its third Gender Budget for FY 2024–2025.

#### 2.2 Objectives of the Gender Budget:

The overall objectives of the Budget are:



To facilitate informed planning and budgeting of programmes and schemes, both direct and indirect, that will help improve the status of girls and women.



To ensure transparency and accountability of public spending on women.



To facilitate convergence between all departments in promoting gender sensitive schemes and programmes.



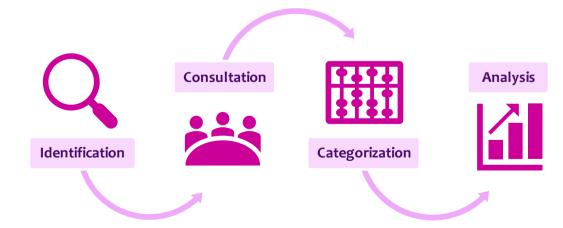
To strengthen the capacity of government officials to incorporate gender needs in planning and evaluation at all levels.



To align the State's policies and programmes to meet the targets under the fifth Sustainable Development Goal (SDG-5) i.e., "Achieving gender equality and empowering all women and girls".

#### 2.3 Process and Methodology of the Gender Budget

The process and methodology of the Gender budgeting consists of four-steps as illustrated in the figure below:



PROCESS	METHODOLOGY
IDENTIFICATION	Government's budget team identifies list of schemes and programmes supporting women and items (grants, subhead items etc.) are mapped from the state budget.
CONSULTATION	Post identification, in-depth discussions are initiated by budget team of the Government of Meghalaya with the departments to understand the rationale of scheme, proportion of allocation to women etc.
CATEGORISATION	After consultation, items such as schemes, programmes of various departments are categorized into the following:  • PARTA: This part of the statement includes women specific programmes – those that have 100% allocation for women.  • PART B: This part of the statement includes prowomen programmes – those that have 30-99% allocation for women.
ANALYSIS	Post categorization, the state budget is analyzed by the team to understand the fund allocation, trends etc

**Note**: As the exercise for preparation of this budget was undertaken, last year's budget was thoroughly analyzed; scheme/programme wise and all the relevant heads of expenditure were captured into respective categories subjectively. New schemes/programmes were added based on the analysis and some schemes/programmes were discontinued as they are no longer relevant. For the comparison to be uniform, the calculations across the budget are done maintaining the list of items identified this year

## 3 Analysis: Gender Budget 2024-25

#### 3.1 Budget Overview

The Gender Budget for Financial Year (FY)2024-25 has a total budget outlay of ₹5,271.01 crores which is an increase of 57.1% from the last financial year. The Gender Budget FY 2024-25 constitutes 19.5% of the total State Budget, as compared to 15% in FY 2023-24. A total of 28 departments contribute to the Gender Budget FY 2024-25. The total budget outlay of Part A is approximately ₹1,525.21 crores. Whereas the total budget outlay of Part B is approximately ₹3,745.80 crores.

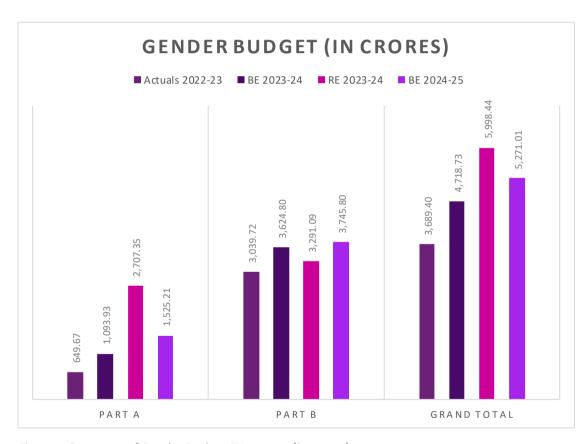


Figure 1: Summary of Gender Budget FY 2024-25 (in crores)

It may be noted that, as seen in figure 1, the difference between Revised Estimate 2023-24 (Rs. 2,707.35 crores) and Budget Estimate 2024-25 (Rs. 1,525.21 crores) for Part A is significantly higher, as more than 1 lakh houses were sanctioned at one time in the FY 2023-24 under the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana.

#### 3.2 Department-wise Allocation

As seen, in the figure below the Education Department contributes the highest to the Gender Budget with a total outlay of Rs. 1668.35 crores (32%). Further, the Community and Rural Development Department with a total outlay of Rs. 1321.07 crores contribute 25% to the Gender Budget. Thirdly, the Health and Family Welfare Department (18%) contributes to the Gender Budget with a total outlay of Rs. 958.54 crores. The Social Welfare Department contributes 7% and the Planning, Investment, Promotion and Sustainable Development Department contributes 6% to the Gender Budget with a total outlay of Rs. 346.95 crores and Rs. 341.23 crores respectively.

# Gender - Department wise Allocation

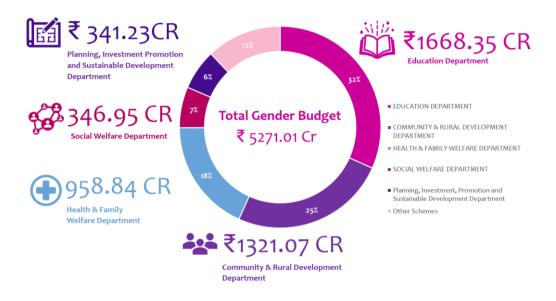


Figure 2: Department-wise Allocation for Gender Budget FY 2024-25 (in crores)

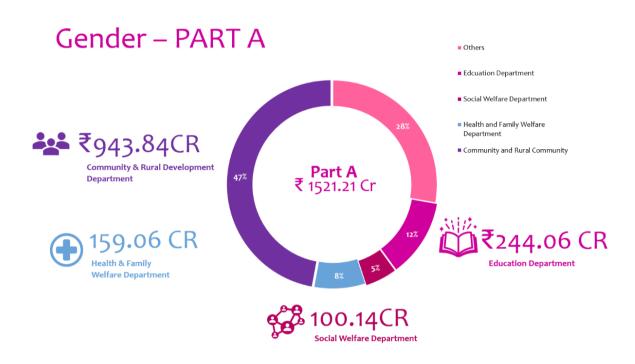


Figure 3: Budget Estimate for Part A in FY 2024-25 (in crores)

In Part A, as seen in figure 3, the schemes for women with 100% budgetary allocation has a total outlay of Rs. 1521.21 crores. It has the highest contribution from the Department of Community & Rural Development with a total outlay of Rs. 943.84 crores, followed by the Education department with a total outlay of Rs. 244.06 crores. The Department of Health & Family Welfare and the Department of Social Welfare have a total budget outlay of Rs. 159.06 crores and Rs. 100.14 crores to the Gender Budget 2024-25 respectively.

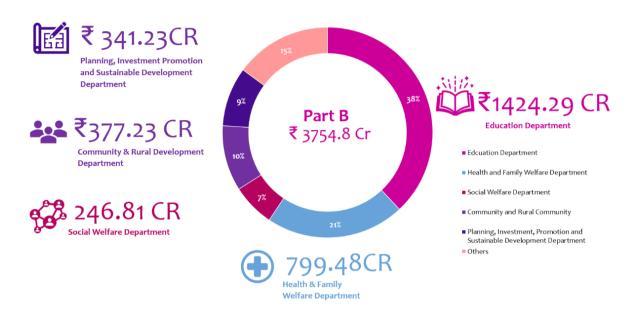


Figure 4: Budget Estimate for Part B in FY 2024-25 (in crores)

In Part B, as seen in figure 4, the schemes with pro-women budget allocation (30% - 99%) has the highest contribution from the Education department with a total outlay of Rs. 1,424.29 crores, followed by the Department of Health & Family Welfare with a total outlay of Rs. 799.48 crores. The Department of Community & Rural Development have a total budget outlay of Rs. 377.23 crores. The Department of Planning, Investment, Promotion and Sustainable Development and the Department of Social Welfare have a total budget outlay of Rs. 341.23 crores and Rs. 246.81 crores to the Gender Budget 2024-25 respectively.

## 4 Towards a Gender-Inclusive Meghalaya

#### 4.1 Empowering Minds: Gender in Education

Quality education is a cornerstone in the pursuit of gender equality, offering a pathway to empowerment, economic independence, and social mobility for all individuals regardless of gender. Ensuring equal opportunity to education, free from discrimination and gender biases, lays the foundation for dismantling societal barriers and promoting inclusivity. Investing in education of girls, tends to help girls and women make informed decisions enabling them to advocate for themselves and participate fully in societal development.

With a total budget allocation of ₹ 1,668.35 crores in Education, the Government of Meghalaya has been focused towards strengthening and institutionalizing formal education for both boys and girls. The State has been equally persistent in promoting vocational education to enhance skill development to raise the job-market value of the people of Meghalaya.

The State scheme such as the Digital Classroom Initiative is a pioneering venture at bolstering the educational landscape to prepare students for the future, improve knowledge retention, utilize multiple teaching tools, and foster better student engagement.

#### 4.1.1 Digital Classroom Initiative

The Government of Meghalaya has embarked on a transformative journey with its Digital Classroom initiative. This comprehensive program encompasses the provision of crucial infrastructure and educational support, including digital content aligned with MBOSE, modern furniture, smart boards, 2KVAUPS, printers, and a technologically advanced setup comprising desktops, LAN, internet, and UPS in schools. Notably, the government has taken proactive measures to enhance the standards of teaching and learning in Govt. aided schools by providing essential training to Secondary/Higher Secondary Teachers.

#### **Digital Classroom Initiative**





Ms. Solmila G Marak is a tenth-grade student at Garobadha H.S. School in South-West Garo Hills. Her narrative emerges as a testament to the success of the Digital Classroom program. She ardently believes that these digital learning spaces go beyond offering mere educational opportunities. They inspire students to delve into learning in an innovative and exciting manner. The implementation of digital classroom infrastructure has, without a doubt, significantly elevated the learning experience for Ms. Marak and her peers.

#### 4.2 Caring for Caregivers: Strengthening Reproductive and Maternal Health

Reproductive and maternal health plays a pivotal role in achieving gender equality by addressing the fundamental rights and needs of women. Access to comprehensive reproductive healthcare services, including family planning, prenatal care, and safe childbirth, empowers women to makes informed decisions about their bodies, careers, and families. It further reduces the risk of maternal mortality and morbidity, enabling women to participate more actively in social, economic, and political spheres. It fosters a supportive environment for women's rights and autonomy, challenging societal norms and inequalities that perpetuate gender discrimination and oppression.

With a total budget allocation of ₹ 958.54 crores in Public Health and Family Welfare, the Government of Meghalaya has been focused towards strengthening reproductive and maternal health. The Government introduced the Chief Minster's Safe Motherhood Scheme and MOTHERS App aiming to improve access to quality ante-natal care and maximize institutional delivery.

#### 4.2.1 Chief Minister's Safe Motherhood Scheme

The Chief Minister's Safe Motherhood Scheme (CM-SMS) was launched in 2022 with an overall goal to improve the maternal health care services in the State, and, thereby, to reduce the maternal mortality rate. The scheme is being implemented through the National Health Mission and district health societies.

#### **Chief Minister's Safe Motherhood Scheme**





The impact of CMSMS is evident in the remarkable increase in institutional deliveries, rising from 64% between January-October 2022 to an impressive 69% during the same period in 2023. Furthermore, maternal deaths have significantly decreased from 228 in the financial year 2021-22 to 158 in the financial year 2022-23. An additional noteworthy achievement is that 2098 individual pregnant women have benefited from transit home services provided through the program.

Recognizing the importance of community involvement, Meghalaya has established Village Health Councils (VHCs) as community institutions. These councils play a crucial role in promoting health-seeking behavior among community members and educating them about the various benefits available under government initiatives, including the impactful Chief Minister's Safe Motherhood Scheme. The success of CMSMS not only reflects in the statistical improvements but also in the positive transformation of health-seeking attitudes within the community.



#### 4.2.2 MOTHER App

In 2019, the State Government of Meghalayalaunched aninnovative way to track the health of expectant mothers and ensure safe deliveries of infants across the state through the MOTHER app. It is an application used for collecting real-time data on pregnant women. The data is collected from the field by the ANMs and shared with doctors and health officials at the district and state level who can track the pregnancy progress of expectant mothers displayed in the dashboard of the MOTHER app.

#### 4.3 Building the Blocks: Exploring Gender Dynamics in Growth Paradigms

Women's economic participation is an important aspect of achieving the developmental goal of gender equality. Enabling women fully participate in the economy is not only growth focused but also diversifies economies, reduces income inequalities, mitigates demographic shifts, and contributes to stability in the financial sector.

With a total budget allocation of ₹1,321.07 crores in Community and Rural Development, Government of Meghalaya has been focused towards enabling financial inclusivity for women by facilitating growth of women led enterprises, in alignment with the goal for gender equality promoted by the Government of India in the Union Budget 2023-24.

The State introduced schemes such as the Farmer's collectivization for Upscaling Production and Marketing System (FOCUS and FOCUS+), Promotion and Incubation of Market Driven Enterprises (PRIME) etc. in line with this objective to ensure higher income generation through value addition of produce and creating market linkage for the produce by the beneficiaries.

# 4.3.1 Farmer's Collectivization for Upscaling Production and Marketing System (FOCUS)

The FOCUS and FOCUS+ scheme was launched as a flagship state scheme in 2 021 to benefit agricultural households across Meghalaya through collectivization of farmers. Through this scheme, financial aid of Rs. 5000 per household is envisaged to be provided directly to the beneficiary. The previous arm of the scheme, FOCUS, has highlighted its potential to support farmers in building farm to market initiatives such as Lakadong turmeric, milk, spices, and aroma.

With women in Meghalaya holding 34% land ownership, this schemes specifically benefits women farmers with financial assistance enabling them to thrive in the agricultural sector.

#### **Progressive Farming Producer Group**





Belinda Kharsati, a resident of Pomahir village in the Mawryngkneng block, is a member of the Progressive Farming Producer Group, which primarily focuses on cultivating tomatoes for their livelihood. Unfortunately, the group encountered significant financial challenges in the aftermath of the pandemic. Belinda recounts the difficulties she faced, emphasizing the sharp decline in market demand for tomatoes, leading to a decrease in the prices of their produce. Compounding the issue, the lack of market demand left her unable to sell her tomatoes, resulting in significant losses.

However, a positive turn of events occurred when Belinda and her fellow farmers became associated with the **FOCUS Program**. This program proved to be a lifeline for them, offering solutions to the challenges they were grappling with. Belinda expresses her gratitude for the support provided under the FOCUS Program, acknowledging the assistance of the government. She is optimistic about the future as the funding received will enable her to not only overcome the current hardships but also enhance her production in the years to come.

Belinda sees the financial aid as an opportunity to revitalize her farming endeavors, ensuring a more sustainable and resilient agricultural practice. With a renewed sense of hope and the means to invest in her farm, she looks forward to leveraging the FOCUS Program to not only recover from the setbacks brought about by the pandemic but also to thrive in the agricultural sector.

#### 4.3.2 Promotion and Incubation of Market-driven Enterprises (PRIME)

PRIME which stands for Promotion and Incubation of Market-driven Enterprises, was launched in 2020 to support entrepreneurship in Meghalaya by providing market access, skill development, technology, and credit linkages to aspiring entrepreneurs.

The transformative shift in Meghalaya's economic land scape is evident through the PRIME program. This initiative, focusing on supporting entrepreneurs through dedicated hubs, funding assistance, credit accessibility, incubation, and mentoring, has already made a significant impact. With a positive influence on 4395 individuals and funding provided to 397 entrepreneurs, PRIME heralds a new era of growth and prosperity driven by homegrown talent and innovative ideas.

Meghalaya's burgeoning start-up culture has found a catalyst in proactive initiatives aimed at nurturing innovation and entrepreneurship within the state. PRIME proves to be specifically beneficial for women entrepreneurs as it mitigates gender based structural inequalities by providing equal opportunity and improving market access for women.

#### **Eriweave**

"I started this venture on erisilk spinning and handloom weaving in 2019 with the mission to enhance livelihood of women through erisilk handloom weaving, through this venture we add value to the erisilk cocoon by converting it into yarn and fabric instead of selling it raw hence generate revenue and enhance income of the women. The idea was selected as Top25 Chief Minister's E-Championship challenge 2021(cohort2) incubated at prime hub Shillong in 2021-22. It was during the incubation period that the idea changed into a full-fledged business and Eriweave was established as a private limited company in 2022 with the support of the mentor and the legal services provided from PRIME.



The mentoring and capability building bootcamps have empowered and enabled us to execute and implement our business idea successfully, the networking that we get from prime helped me to scale up my business with the business support grant of 1 lakh and the kick-start grant of 5 lakhs. The amount was used to procure solar spinning machines and raw materials to increase production capacity."

#### 4.4 Safeguarding Intersections: Welfare Measures

Implementing welfare measures can have profound impact on advancing gender equality by addressing the specific challenges and vulnerabilities faced by women across intersections. By adopting an intersectional approach, policymakers can design initiatives that target the specific needs of each intersection, ensuring that no woman is left behind in the pursuit of gender equality. By recognizing and addressing the unique needs of any marginalised group, welfare measures promote social inclusion and equal participation in society, challenging discriminatory norms and stereotypes.

With a total budget allocation of ₹ 346.95 crores, the Government of Meghalaya has been focused towards maximizing social welfare benefits. In this regard, the government had introduced the CM-CARes scheme in 2012 primarily to address the challenges of senior citizens, single mothers, widows, people with disability in the form of pension. Providing financial assistance ensures that the marginalised group of people in these situations can access essential resources and services, enabling them to maintain their economic independence and support their families. This scheme has aided more than 1 lakh beneficiaries in the past years.

# 4.4.1 Chief Minister's Comfort, Assist, Respect and Empowered Scheme (CM-CAREs)

This scheme was launched in 2012 to provide financial assistance to senior citizens, single mothers, widows and disabled in the form of pension. It is given to those who belong to households with less than Rs. 36000 income per annum. The overarching objective of this scheme to provide income security against social and economic uncertainties and improve social and economic justice.

#### 4.5 Relieving the Invisible Load: Unpaid Care Work

The Time Use Survey (TUS) is conducted in India to account for the participation of men, women, and other groups of persons in paid and unpaid work. According to the first TUS conducted in 2019, its findings shed light on the pervasive nature of unpaid care work and its implications for gender equality, emphasizing the need for targeted interventions to address this issue and promote women's empowerment and well-being.

The Department of Planning, Investment, Promotion and Sustainable Development with a total outlay of Rs. 341.23 crores in the Gender Budget have contributed immensely towards forwarding the cause of gender equality. One such programme is the Sustainable Transport and Efficient Mobility Society (STEMS).

#### Sustainable Transport and Efficient Mobility Society (STEMS) 4.5.1

STEMS is a society incorporated by the Government of Meghalaya in 2022, to revolutionize the way people commute by leveraging modern transport solutions that are safe, sustainable, efficient, and cost-effective.

With an investment of nearly ₹ 20 crores, this initiative has proven to be successful in minimizing the struggles of students in their daily commute to schools, in the process of it also alleviating parents from unpaid care work and leaving them with more time for themselves and productive work. For STEMS, the safety of Children is Paramount and parents are appreciating the app features as well as the presence of Caretakers.

## 5 Envisioning Gender: Way Forward

With the Gender Budget FY 2024-25, the Government of Meghalaya envisions to augment holistic development of women in the State. Considering the present status of women, the Gender Budget aims to further leverage the empowerment of women as an accelerator to the socio-economic advancement of Meghalaya. The State, through the centrally sponsored schemes, state schemes, and externally funded projects, is currently implementing several initiatives that promote gender equality. Through Gender-responsive budgeting, the State is focused on paving the pathway to gender equality through provision of quality education, advance livelihood generation, strengthen maternal health and safeguard welfare for all.

Going forward, the State will be focusing on expanding skill development training for women to meet the job market demand. This shall directly help in achieving Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 4- Quality Education. It will also support the advancing of the SDGs 1, 5, 10- No poverty, Gender Equality and Reduced Inequalities respectively. The State is working towards strengthening the access to financial services and improvement of livelihood generation through the NRLM scheme. Additionally, the State is also focusing on providing support to women co-operative societies to facilitate market linkages for women-led enterprises. The state envisions to forward the efforts of the Self- Help Groups through the Meghalaya State Rural Livelihood society to enable financial freedom and higher decision-making power. This will further the SDG 8- Decent work & Economic Growth along with Goal 5 of Gender Equality.

The State has achieved remarkable heights through the Chief Minister's Safe Motherhood Scheme under the National Health Mission by improving access to quality maternal health care. Continued efforts will be taken to ensure maternal mortality and morbidity rates are significantly less. This will further the SDGs 3, 5 and 10-Good Health, Gender Equality and Reduced Inequalities.

Furthermore, the State has been focused on advancing the rights of women across intersections of ability/disability, caste, tribes, status of marriage (widowed women) etc. to ensure inclusivity in welfare schemes. Learning from the cultural ethos of Meghalaya, the State will also strive towards building participatory governance through strong community ties and decentralized planning. This will advance the SDGs 5 and 10- Gender Equality and Reduced Inequalities. This would further support the achievement of SDGs 1, 2 and 3- No Poverty, Zero Hunger and Good Health respectively.

Efforts will also be taken to promote socio-political development of women by strengthening the safety mechanisms and participation in governance. Moreover, in the Gender Budget 202-25, the budget allocation for Part B is more than Part A by 16.7%, implying that the schemes with 100% allocation of budget for women is lesser than the schemes in Part B which only qualify for 30% to 99% of allocation for women. This demonstrates that while pro-women initiatives are being undertaken, it does not contribute extensively towards gender responsive budgeting. Therefore, going forward, the State will be more focused on women-centric schemes with 100% allocation to ensure further gender specific needs are met.
